Update on street repairs to address flooding: Street repairs began in December 2013 to alleviate flooding in Meadowcreek. The Civic Club received the following message:

ReBuild Houston Project Underway in District E Local Drainage Project at Crooked Creek

The Local Drainage Project at the <u>5400 block of Crooked Creek</u> will provide improvements to address localized storm water drainage issues in the area. This approximately \$86,955 project, which runs along Crooked Creek at Timbercreek, 77017, began in May 2014 and is anticipated to be complete by July 2014.

A Local Drainage Project is a small scale project that strives to optimize the existing drainage system with repairs and enhancements. This may include the repair, removal and/or replacement of storm sewers, manholes, and inlets; as well as roadway pavement, curbs, sidewalks and access ramps.

The ReBuild Houston Initiative is the City of Houston's voter approved pay-as-you-go plan to rebuild drainage and street infrastructure. Its goal is to improve quality of life and mobility for residents through the reconstruction and proper maintenance of drainage and street improvements. The Local Drainage Project at the 5400 block of Crooked Creek is an active example of ReBuild Houston at work to better serve you.

http://cnp.centerpointenergy.com/outage . Just follow the online instructions and they will send you a confirmation .





HPD's Neighbor NextDoor website: www.nextdoor.com

Nextdoor is a free social network for residents and the police department. Although still in its pilot stage, it has 400 neighborhoods already participating in **Nextdoor**. HPD will use the tool to strengthen neighbor-to-neighbor communications and will share important news, information on services and programs, and provide notification to neighborhoods signed up on the platform.

Each Houston neighborhood has the option of its own private **Nextdoor** neighborhood website, accessible only to residents of that neighborhood. Residents can use their website to get to know their neighbors, ask questions and exchange information about neighborhood watch and safety issues, and much more.



GOT GROCERIES? (ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT)

Decisions, decisions...Do I go to Kroger or HEB for groceries? This question has been in the minds of Meadowcreek Village residents since 2009 when the local Kroger store on Richey was closed that winter. You may have noticed that the neighborhood is undergoing a revitalization from new trees at the park to new street resurfacing. The Civic Club has been very active in interacting with our elected officials to bring about economic development to Meadowcreek Village as the up-and-coming neighborhood in 2013 according to Swamplot. However, we need YOUR help! With Hobby Airport becoming an international airport, the major thoroughfares in our area may experience a new boom and perhaps we may get new neighbors as well. Many of you have voiced your concern to the Civic Club on bringing back Kroger or another high-end grocery store that provides a greater variety of products and the organic products Meadowcreek Village residents were accustomed to purchasing at the Richey location. Well, we have good news. The City of Houston wants to hear from YOU. It has taken interest in our request for a new grocery store and economic development for our neighborhood that would improve the quality of life in Meadowcreek Village. Dear Ms. Tillotson,

Please accept this letter as a formal request to assist Meadowcreek Village, its residents and Civic Club in bringing back a high-end grocery store. In 2009, we lost Kroger that was located on Richey Street. Since then, residents seeking organic products have to travel to Pasadena for the nearest Kroger and/or inside the 610-Loop in search of these items. We currently have a "Foodorama" (in District I), a "Food Town" (in Pasadena) and a "Bravo Ranch" (where the Kroger once existed) as "options" for grocery shopping. However, these stores lack a variety of products from produce to home-based goods that are either organic, eco-friendly or good quality.

Meadowcreek Village won the Swamplot Award for Houston's Best Neighborhood in 2012 and was recently showcased by Swamplot in 2013 for being an "up-and-coming neighborhood with an active civic club." It is safe to assume that Meadowcreek Village will be recognized again in 2014. We anticipate more traffic coming to our area with our proximity to Hobby Airport and Hobby's conversion to an international airport.

Please directly contact the Meadowcreek Village Civic Club on how you can assist Meadowcreek Village accomplish its goal of having a high-end grocery store again and how the neighborhood can attract good businesses that would help improve the quality of life. The heat of summer is among us! and true to their word "Trees for Houston" has been watering the trees they planted at the park at least once a week. Houston Parks and Recreations have also been watering the trees around the playground!



So how much water does a tree need anyway? A good soaking at least once a week

and how many gallons of water is "a good soaking"? Trees need water to reach the roots, typically within the 6-12 inches of depth.

A good test of this is to try sticking a screwdriver into the ground. If it will penetrate 6 inches deep the trees are probably getting enough water. If it does not, then keep watering.
