Last Month At-A-Glance

July's meeting was themed on neighborhood safety tips from our neighborhood HPD Officer Jerry Rodriguez & Michelle Flores, VP of Membership along with a representative from Center Point Energy as a guest speaker on smart meters.

HPD Officer Rodriguez on How to Address Crime in Meadowcreek:

Currently, HPD is short-handed on the number of police officers on patrol due to budgetary reasons with only 10 officers per year joining the force. However, the doing the following tips will help keep you and the neighborhood safe.

KNOW your neighbors – Introduce yourself to your neighbors, get their names and contact information, and be sure to exchange your information as well. Being neighborly creates awareness on your street, and has the added bonus of having a phone tree handy for when the need arises.


Smart phones & Cameras – If you have a smart phone, be sure to video record or take pictures of suspicious individuals and/or activity. If you capture suspicious activity, please submit the video and/or pictures to HPD.

Description – Stay calm when witnessing suspicious activity and get a good description of the individual(s) – gender, clothing, age, ethnicity, distinctive features, such as tattoos/piercings, etc.

Vehicles – License plate – full or partial plate number, make & model of vehicle, color and distinctive features, such as tinted windows, stickers, embellishments, etc.

HPD – Notify, report and forward the above information to HPD via phone. Register for HPD's crime prevention website: <u>www.nextdoor.com</u> and report the information there as well. By registering on this website, you give HPD immediate access and information that allows HPD to see/map occurrences in the neighborhood.

Facebook – If you have an active account, be sure to join the "Meadowcreek Village" group page. Neighbors often post lost pets, welcome new neighbors, announce community events and report suspicious activity.

Center Point Energy on Smart Meters:

Center Point Energy maintains the lines for all energy/electric providers. This means that whenever there is a power outage the customer notifies his/her electric company, the electric company then notifies Center Point of the outage to be addressed.

Smart meters are now used. Center Point no longer uses meter reader workers. There should not be any workers wanting to go into your backyard to read your meter. If this happens, call HPD immediately.

To know about a power outage specific to your house and street due to weather or other circumstances, register your information at: <u>www.smartmetertexas.com</u> to receive this information via text message, phone call and/or email notification.

Neighborhood Burglar Prevention Tips

1. **People are your best defense** -- be a visibly nosy neighbor. Let anyone walking the neighborhood or sitting in a parked car see you watching them. Make a note of car license plates and if anyone behaves suspiciously or stays in their car for a lengthy period, call the police.

2. **Tell close neighbors you trust** if you plan to be away or expect any deliveries. If they're in the know they're more likely to notice something you didn't mention and spot unexpected callers at your home (burglars often call at the front door of a house to check if anyone is there).

3. **And, if you are going away,** use timers to switch lights on and off at random, cancel newspapers and put a hold on your mail deliveries -- or, to guard your schedule, arrange for the trusted neighbor to collect them.

4. **Having a dog is a huge deterrent.** Ironically, burglars are far more likely to avoid a house with a small dog than a big one -- small dogs tend to be nervous and less easy to trick into calming down. They're less trustful and bark louder and longer.

5. **Take a walk around your home,** inside and out, to figure where the weakest link in your security might be -- like leaving a window open in a secluded spot. High-risk places include the door from your garage into the house, back doors, side "breezeways" where a burglar would not be seen, and large shrubs close to the residence where thieves could hide.

6. **Take action to increase protection** in these vulnerable places -- like installing keyed window locks and deadbolts on doors and using toughened glass in windows and doors. Remove those shrubs. If you leave windows open on the second floor, make sure your extension ladder is locked away.

7. **Be wary** about who you allow into your home and how much information you give about your belongings and schedule. This applies even with neighbors you don't know or fully trust ("inside" jobs are not uncommon). And don't leave valuables in view, inside or from outside the house.

8. **If you're able,** vary the times you leave and return home. If your household has several cars, vary who drives them, making it more difficult for an observer to know who is home and when.

Neighborhood Burglar Prevention Tips continued:

9. Make it tough for home burglary prowlers to know whether they're under surveillance. Fake cameras can be good -- but only if they could be taken for the real thing, not cheap plastic devices with flashing lights, which home burglars easily identify. A good camera system can cost around \$500 – if you install it yourself. Fake security stickers or signs don't work either, but, if you have an alarm, real stickers and signs work. 10. Control access to and around your property. Consider motion-activated lights, even on the street outside your home. Neighborhood Watch, Video Surveillance, No Parking, and No Outlet signs can be effective against home burglary too. This way, would-be thieves know you mean business.

11. **Motion-activated cameras** are another powerful weapon -- both as a home burglary deterrent and, linked to a computer (and, better yet, to a home network), to record images of your unwelcome visitors. These days, these devices are inexpensive. Network-linked cameras costing around \$85 can even email images so you have an off-site backup (it can send images automatically to a separate email account, so that even if the camera is disabled, the pictures are still available online).

12. **An alarm system,** preferably with a visible box outside the house, will not only deter crooks but sound an immediate alert of a home burglary. You might seriously consider a system that's monitored 24/7 by a security company who will quickly notify law enforcement of an incident. (beware of the big names however, there are monitoring services that cost as little as \$15/month.

13. Gates to your property can also be a home burglary deterrent, (even if there is another way out).



Renters could have a temporary sticker they must surrender at the end of their lease, while visitors collect a pass which they must return on leaving.

14. **Avoid creating temptation.** Don't leave things like lawn mowers and bikes unattended outside; lock them up. Inside, burglars are more likely to go for "middle of the road" valuables than expensive jewelry and appliances -- because they're easier to redeem for cash.

15. **Don't hide a key.** Home burglary crooks know all those "secret" places. One reporter recalls: "I interviewed a burglar who hit the same house every few years for 30 years. Astonishingly, as he was showing us what he liked about it, he jumped out of the car to show us where they had hidden the key, over the door, for about 10 years!"

There were about seven of us in attendance at the most recent of the monthly **PIP** (Positive Interaction Program) meetings held at the Houston Police Department's Eastside Division sub-station, on 7525 Sherman (one block from Harrisburg & 75th St) every 3rd Monday of the month. We had a chance to meet the officers that patrol the neighborhood.

For this month's topic Captain Dobbins invited Jackie Miller from the City of Houston Public Safety Department. Ms. Miller discussed disaster preparedness including weather related and human-caused disasters.

Some websites that were sited to stay informed is **houstontx.gov/emergency** for accurate information. Houstons residents can receive emergency notifications by signing up at **alerts.houstonoem.org.** For individuals with access and special functional needs they should register State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry (STEAR) by visiting **texasstear.org** or dialing 211. All this information can be found the **"Disaster Preparedness Guides"** which will be available during the August civic club meeting. Neighborhood news and updates -

One of our civic club members wrote an email to District E Council Member Dave Martin. The subjects of concern were the crime rate in our neighborhood, street racing, and, most recently, graffiti or "tags" that plagued many of the signs and flat surfaces in the area. Mr. Martin was asked, if there were any "out-of-the-box" ideas to decrease the crime and street racing.

Correspondence from Mr. Martin's office replied: that Meadowcreek Village has been extremely engaged on a variety of issues for the betterment of the community, and that he for one has been truly impressed with the dedication and organization exhibited by the Meadowcreek Village Civic Club.

Regarding the continuing problem with break-ins and street racing, email from Mr. Martin's office states that it is the, understanding that Captain Dobbins and his team are doing whatever they can to alleviate these unfortunate issues. At the HPD Eastside Division PIP meeting, a few weeks ago Captain Dobbins expressed the difficulty in reducing the number of break-ins due to the fact that many arrested perpetrators make bail and return to their criminal activities before they go to trial. It was stated further that understands that HPD has made many recent arrests in the area in the past month or so and there is hope that once these individuals face trial the instances of theft will be greatly reduced. In response to an earlier email by another concerned resident regarding the illegal street racing, Captain Dobbins noted that he was going to have his patrol units increase their visibility along Allendale and HWY 3.

Mr. Martin's office statement: "We greatly appreciate the initiative you and your club take in pursuing betterment for the Meadowcreek Village community. As the city has a limited number of resources, it truly aids us in our ability to best do our job when communities like yours are such engaged partners. We will continue to be in touch with Captain Dobbins and his team to follow up on these issues, and please feel free to contact us any time with any further questions or concerns."


